### SPRING BULK CLEAN-UP WEEK OF MAY 22<sup>ND</sup>-28<sup>TH</sup>

Spring bulk clean-up for Township Residents will be the week of May 22, 2022 on your regular collection day. Please place debris within five feet of the road the night before. If you utilize garbage bag tags this will be the **only** time you are permitted to participate in bulk collection without having to pay an additional fee. #### **BUILDING PERMITS**

Remember to obtain a permit before you start your construction! For any construction 1,000 square feet or less and <u>not</u> attached to a residential dwelling, please obtain a permit from the Township Office. Anything over 1,000 square feet (non-agricultural) or anything attached to your residential dwelling you will need to obtain a permit from one of the code officials listed below. At the January, 2020 organizational meeting the Board of Supervisors appointed three options for code officials for Residents to choose from.

## Roads of Delaware Township

# Taken from "A Land Use Plan for Delaware Township - 1967"

Earliest routes of travel in Delaware Township were Indian trials and the larger streams.

In 1803 the Shenango River was declared a public highway. (The Erie Extension Canal – in operation between 1840-1871 – provided slow unsanitary and unhealthful transportation) nevertheless we would not minimize its impact on industry in the county.

The state, as early as 1807, appropriated funds for building improved roads, turnpikes or toll-roads in Mercer County – shortened to "pike" – indicating that a pike or pole formed a barrier across the road at the toll-collecting point.

The Mercer-Greenville Turnpike Road Company was chartered in 1830; ninety-two years later the dirt road was paved and travelers and people who lived along the way shook off the dust which in dry weather was so annoying and pulled out of the mud of wet weather.

One by one, side roads of the township were improved with gravel and during the administration of Governor Gifford Pinchot, some were black-topped with a hard surface until today most of the township roads are passable winter or summer.

Tax payers who formerly worked out their road tax now pay the tax and men with machines take care of the roads.

## "Firsts of the Township"

First sawmill (upright) was built (1823) by Samuel Williamson upon a little stream which the Indians called Lowango (now in the present village of New Hamburg).

In 1838 another was constructed on a stream, today known as Kremm Run, about 1 mile south of Oniontown. This second with upright

saw was yet in operation in 1890 – making shingles, etc.

The first elections in the township were held in the home of Samuel Caldwell, Sr. – where a hat served as a ballot box.

The first grist mill was erected by John Donaldson in 1832. (The last feed and flour mill was operated by Daniel Frantz from 1905-1940).

The first post office in Delaware Township was established at Delaware Grove in 1835 (Disconnected 1886) where the first store was also built (1834). A post office was established at New Hamburg (1853), at Kremis (1880).

Samuel Caldwell, Jr. purchased the first threshing machine in the township – where previously <u>every one</u> threshed his grain with a flail.

Eli George bought the first lot in the Village of New Hamburg where (1838) he built the first shop (tin shop).

John Stamm built the first tannery in the village – laid out by Peter Beil who wove cloth and bed coverlets (treasured now by descendants).

Daniel Hecker was the first Justice of the Peace in New Hamburg.
